As per an in-depth discussion about computational aspects of time value of money scenarios, Berk,J. et al. (2019) points out that most of the time value of money situations involve computation of Present Value or Future Value. However, in case a deposit is made into a bank account, it may require calculating how long it will take before the balance reaches a certain level. To add to this, Brooks,R. (2018) interestingly explains the rule of thumb that financiers developed which was known as the Rule of 72. This rule still works quite accurately for interest rates between 2 percent and 30 percent. As per the Rule of 72, just divide 72 by the interest rate to find the length of time it takes to double your money. For example, to double your money at the interest rate of 8 percent, it shall approximately take 9 (72 divided by 8) years. Further, he supports this with his findings that the Rule of 72 is fairly accurate for the middle range of interest rates. It overestimates the time it takes to double below 8 percent and underestimates over 8 percent. However, to accurately solve for required number of years (n) and for a specific given Present Value to become equal to an amount that of a given Future Value at given Discount Rate, the method computingN() is developed. This method computingN() gives n (required number of years) when values are passed to its three arguments. Here r is annual rate, pv is Present Value and fv is Future Value. The output gives value of n,the number of years that are rounded off to three decimal places. So, an output of 6.637 means 6.637 Years.

Berk,J. et al. (2019) defines rate of return as the rate at which the value of an amount invested grows to fund the future cash flow(s) of an investment. In some situations, this rate of return has to be computed when the Present Value and Future Value are known and the interest rate (or rate of return) that equates to Present and Future Value needs to be computed. Brooks,R. (2018) elaborates on the ten important points about the Time Value of Money equation belonging to a single cash flow. Here, Brooks,R. (2018) states that the equation essentially has four variables (r, n, pv and fv), and three out of these four variables must be known before you can solve for the missing or unknown variable. The method `computingROR()` computes required rate of return (r) for a specific given amount of Present Value (pv) to become equal to that of a given amount of Future Value (fv) in given number of years (n). So, `computingROR()` gives r (interest rate or required rate of return) when values are passed to its three arguments. Here, n is number of Years, pv is Present value and fv is Future Value. The output gives value of r, the Required Rate of Return that is rounded off to three decimal places. So, an output of 0.186 means a return of 18.6 percent.

According to Titman,S. et al. (2017), when interest is earned on both the initial principal and the reinvested interest during prior periods, the result is called Compound Interest. This process of accumulating interest on an investment over multiple time periods is called Compounding. As the number of compounding periods per year increases so does the effective annual rate (EAR). This is so because the greater the number of compounding periods is, the more often interest is earned on interest. Based on this, you can easily compute the EAR when interest is compounded daily (that is compounded 365 times). We can just as easily calculate the EAR if the interest is compounded every hour (that is compounded 8,760 times), every minute (that is compounded 525,600 times), or every second (that is compounded 31,536,000 times). We can even calculate the EAR when interest is continuously compounded, that is, when the time intervals between interest payments are infinitely small. The method fvContinuousCompSingleCF() is developed to calculate Future Value of a Single Cash Flow under continuous compounding and gives you a future value when

values are passed to its three arguments. Here, r is annual rate, n is number of years and p_v is Present Value. The output gives Future Value of a Single Cash Flow under continuous compounding, that is rounded off to two decimal places. A minus value like -206.09 represents Outflow of the Cash. Whereas a positive value like 206.09 represents an Inflow of the cash.

As described by Titman,S. et al. (2017), Time Value of Money calculations are essentially comparisons between Present Value, that is what a cash flow is worth to you today, and Future Value, that is what a cash flow will be worth in the future. In addition, this Future Value is impacted by the frequency of compounding. In most of the situations the compounding period is an year in length. However, this is not always true. For instance, when banks offer saving accounts that Compound Interest every day, month, or quarter. Depositor in this scenario should prefer more frequent compounding because more interest is earned when more is compounded more frequently. Most common compounding situation includes daily, monthly, quarterly, and yearly compounding. Based on this, method fvDailyCompSingleCF() calculates Future Value of a Single Cash Flow for daily compounding scenario. The method fvDailyCompSingleCF() gives fv when values are passed to its three arguments. Here r, is annual rate, n is number of years and pv is Present Value. The output gives Future Value of a Single Cash Flow for daily compounding scenario, that is rounded off to two decimal places. A minus value like -4450.69 represents Outflow of the Cash. Whereas a positive value like 4450.69 represents an Inflow of the cash.

According to Brooks,R. (2018), when you deposit money in a certificate of deposit (CD) at a bank, the bank is technically borrowing or renting money from you with a promise to repay that money with interest. Let us assume that you purchase a CD for \$500 with a promised annual percentage rate of 5 percent. The annual percentage rate (APR) is the yearly rate that you earn by investing or in other words, this is a charge for borrowing. Although the financial institution quotes the 5 percent interest rate on an annual basis, these institutions in fact often pay interest quarterly, monthly, or even daily. The period in which the financial institution applies interest is the Compounding Period, and the number of times it adds interest to an account each year is the Compounding Periods per Year. The method fvMonthlyCompSingleCF() computes Future Value (fv) of a Single Cash Flow under Monthly Compounding Frequency and gives fv when values are passed to its three arguments. Here r is annual rate, n is number of years and pv is Present Value.

Details

On the topic of making Interest Rates comparable, Titman,S. et al. (2017), remarks that sometimes it is difficult to determine exactly how much you are paying or earning on a loan. That is so because the loan might be quoted not as compounding annually but rather as compounding quarterly or daily. If there are two loans say, one that is quoted as 8.084 percent compounded annually and one that is quoted as 7.85 percent compounded quarterly, then these are difficult to compare because the interest on one is compounded annually (you pay or receive interest just once a year) but the interest on the other is compounded quarterly (you pay or receive interest four times a year). To allow borrowers to compare rates between different lenders, what is known as the annual percentage rate (APR) must be clearly specified in the deal document. The annual percentage rate (APR) indicates the interest rate paid or earned in one year without compounding. We can calculate APR as the interest rate per period (for example, per month or week) multiplied by the number of periods during which compounding occurs during the year. So an interest rate of 2 percent per month would mean 24 percent per year. APR does not help much when the rates being compared are not compounded for the same number of periods per year. In fact, the APR is also called the nominal or quoted (stated) interest rate because it is the rate that the lender states the borrower is paying. In the previous example, both 8.084 percent and 7.85 percent are the APRs, but these are not comparable because the loans have different compounding periods. To make the two rates comparable, we need to calculate their equivalent rates using an annual compounding period. We do this by calculating the effective annual rate (also known as effective annual yield), and the annually compounded rate that produces the same return as the nominal or stated rate. So in the method fvYearlyAnnuityCompDaily() is developed to be used in a scenario similar to the one mentioned above. The method fvYearlyAnnuityCompDaily() internally computes and uses effective Annual rate(yield) for yearly payments that are compounded daily and then gives you Future Value of yearly-paid Ordinary Annuity or Annuity Due that is Compounded daily, when values are passed to its four arguments. Here r is annual rate, n is number of years, pmt is amount of one annuity and bgn is the computational mode. (Enter 1 when annuity payment occurs at the beginning of the period; 0 for end of period payments).

Details

As explained by Hummelbrunner,S.A. et al. (2020), the description of the compounding frequency is usually contained within the phrase that describes the nominal interest rate. An example would be 8 percent compounded quarterly This means that the nominal, or annual, interest rate of 8 percent is compounded four times each year at $8/4$ that is 2 percent, each period. So the method `pvYearlyAnnuityCompQuarterly()` is developed to Compute Present Value(PV) of Yearly Paid Ordinary Annuity or Annuity Due that is compounded Quarterly.The method gives PV when values are passed to its four arguments. Here r is annual rate, n is number of years,pmt is amount of one annuity and bgn is the computational mode. (Enter 1 when annuity payment occurs at the beginning of the period; 0 for end of period payments).

Details

As Hummelbrunner,S.A. et al. (2020) explains, while dealing with annuity scenarios, first we must identify whether the problem is that of an Ordinary Annuity or Annuity Due. In an Ordinary Annuity the payment is made at the end of the payment period, whereas, in Annuity Due payment is made in the beginning of the year. To incorporate this effect, the method pvYearlyAnnuityCompSemiAnnually() is developed to compute Present Value of Yearly Paid Ordinary Annuity or Annuity Due that is compounded Semi-Annually. This method gives Present Value when values are passed to its four arguments. Here r is annual rate, n is number of years,pmt is amount of one annuity and bgn is the mode. (Enter 1 when annuity payment occurs at the beginning of the period; 0 for end of period payments).

Details

As defined by Hummelbrunner,S.A. et al. (2020), a Perpetuity is an annuity in which the periodic payments begin on a fixed date and continue indefinitely. Interest payments on permanently invested sums of money are prime examples of Perpetuity. Dividends on preferred shares fall into this category if the issuing corporation has an indefinite life. Scholarships and trust funds paid perpetually from an endowment also fit the definition of Perpetuity. The method `rorPerpetuity()` is developed to compute Rate of Return(r) of a Perpetuity and gives r when values are passed to its two arguments. Here `yearendCF` is Cash Flow occurring at the Year-End and `deposit` stands for amount of the Deposit
